Hello Everyone.

As we head into winter, it is nice to see rain falling at last and everything briefly green again as the last of the leaves fall. As always, a short update on activity at the Parish Council to keep you up to date.

Dog Mess: We've had reports in several locations, but specifically in Over

Road and the surrounding streets, about people letting their dogs foul on the pavements and verges and irresponsible owners not picking it up. It goes without saying that this isn't acceptable, and it is also a crime. Please, if you have a dog, always carry poo bags with you to clear up as you go and put it in a bin or take it home with you.

Events Working Group: Our appeal for help has yielded five people coming forward to help with organising events. This has meant we've been able to make rapid progress with the Christmas event, and, once the planning is complete, we will move onto planning events next year. We can always do with more hands to help. so please contact the Parish Clerk if you are able to help US.

Planting Trees: We've been lucky enough to secure a substantial number of trees from the various initiatives being run around the Queens Green Canopy initiative. We are hoping to be able to plant some 2000 saplings in the early new year around the village. Some of these will be planted for us, with help provided by the Ministry of Justice as part of their community work; with the rest, we hope to be able to have a community event to plant in certain locations around the village. More details to come on this in December - watch out on Facebook for more information!

Speeding in the Village: While we are working on gathering your feedback on speeding in the village as part of wider traffic and roads issues, our Community Speed-Watch team are eager to continue to operate. Sadly, due to one member stepping down owing to other commitments, they need more people to help out. The commitment isn't huge (a short training course plus as many hours as the members can spend monitoring vehicle speeds) and can make a big difference in our community. Dear Residents,

As stability returns to Westminster, I am glad to welcome Rishi Sunak as our next Prime Minister. Rishi clearly has the support of the vast majority of his colleagues. Moreover, he has the support of

South Cambs - in a survey, residents told me they found him honest, competent, best able to represent us on the world stage, and in the best position to manage the economy. We are already seeing the results of this.

Rishi is right to put the focus back on our 2019 manifesto, the commitments we made when getting elected. Those have never left my mind, and I have reiterated my promises to South Cambridgeshire with letters to ministers on issues including transport plans such as East West Rail, environmental concerns like sewage discharge, and problems with overdevelopment in our area. I will continue to work hard for South Cambridgeshire.

Recently, I have:

- Campaigned to put a stop to the GCP's draconian driving tax, which will add £5 to car journeys for anyone living or working in Cambridge, or using our hospitals.

- Pushed the Combined Authority to tackle the bus crisis facing our residents, seeking answers on why their 'urgent process' was not more efficient.

- Pushed letting agents and local Councillors to act over the former Barclays Bank site in Sawston, which they have now committed to clean up and let.
- Assisted with constituents' visa applications, energy concerns, emergency support, and over 1,000 other cases.

With winter now setting in, we are asking residents to take extra care in the darker evenings, especially in bad weather, as the days are getting shorter and visibility may be reduced.

With the recent by-election in our ward, I would like to congratulate my fellow LibDem District Councillor, Natalie Warren -Green, and Conservative Councillor, Tom Bygott. Well done to all other 7 candidates who stood.

Support for residents in coping with the cost of living: The Council is continuing to collate information about the various sources of help for individuals and households struggling with the cost of living crisis.

Bus Route: Citi 5 Bus route - Longstanton-Bar Hill-Cambridge: This bus will now be stopping as a "hail and ride" service in Northstowe for both inbound and outbound journeys. The route will go in via Pathfinder Way, onto Links Lane then onto Stirling Road, before joining Station Road. Then the reverse coming back into Cambridge City.

Frequency is 30 mins peak, hourly evening. See the timetable https://tinyurl.com/bdfcb79d or use your app. Hopefully this will provide an alternative route to the Busway for our residents. The extension to the route into Northstowe has been funded by Northstowe S106.

Combined Authority (CA) Bus Procurement: The CA's bus procurement concluded last month, with all eighteen routes which had been cut by Stagecoach, along with all of the five reduced services, seeing some level of service reinstated. Part of the Citi5 bus that was cut beyond Northstowe is now a new route 5A that will be a loop around Longstanton Park and Ride, Willingham, Over and Swavesey.

The CA had set aside £1.7M for subsidies to operators to keep them running. Currently, the total cost is expected to be about £1.25M because bus operators were limited in what services they were prepared to provide. The CA will be monitoring how the new services are working. I am working with parents of pupils who attend Swavesey Village College to ensure that the buses get the pupils to/from school.

As well as ensuring vital bus services continue between October and the end of March 2023, the CA is working to put in place a sustainable and affordable bus network from April 2023 onwards.

All this is a sharp reminder of the reality of the current deregulated bus system and the problems caused by sixty per cent of bidding authorities in England, including Cambridgeshire & Peterborough, receiving no Government funding for their Bus Service Improvement Plans (BSIPs).

The CA's Overview & Scrutiny Committee was told in a report from its lead member for buses that two reasons had been given for the failure of the Department for Transport to fund Cambridgeshire's Bus Service Improvement Plan:

- In DfT's view, we had insufficient commitment to road charging, active travel and bus priority schemes in our area.
- The DfT subsequently applied a deprivation index score to each BSIP submitted and, given our high overall growth, this meant that the money tended to be allocated in the north of England rather than to us.

A refreshed Bus Strategy for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough is due to be presented to the CA's Transport & Infrastructure Committee in November, alongside a refreshed Bus Service Improvement Plan and a case for Government investment.

Work is also continuing to further develop the business case for a franchised bus network in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, but this will need money for the necessary investment in the service.

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP): The Greater Cambridge Partnership has now opened its public consultation on its proposals for a significant expansion of bus services in Cambridge and the city's travel to work area, including South Cambridgeshire, to be paid for by the introduction of a congestion charge in Cambridge in 2027/28.

It is very important indeed that local residents here in South Cambridgeshire read the proposals, complete the survey and let the Greater Cambridge Partnership know what the proposals would mean for them.

The survey closes at midday on Friday 23 December. The consultation website, including the survey, brochure, map book, frequently asked questions, public events and webinar dates and contact details can be found at https://consultcambs.uk.engagementhq.com/making-connections-

Mayoral precept: The Mayor of Cambridgeshire & Peterborough meets regularly and informally with leaders of the member councils of the Combined Authority. One idea he raised in one such meeting was whether there might be a case for setting a Mayoral precept to be added to the Council Tax, to fund bus services beyond March 2023. This suggestion was then leaked to the media, with some council leaders then taking the opportunity to oppose the idea from the outset.

We understand Cambridgeshire County Council and Peterborough City Council would both have a veto over such a proposal. A bus network covering more than just a few key urban routes will need public subsidy, and the money for this will need to come from somewhere—either central government or local government.

The government has already refused to fund Cambridgeshire's Bus Service Improvement Plan once. Will we be more fortunate this time? The Chancellor of the Exchequer is also known to be looking for billions of pounds in spending cuts. How likely are we to see the kind of government investment we need?

Locally, some politicians have opposed the Greater Cambridge Partnership congestion charge proposals, and also opposed the idea of a Mayoral precept as we have seen in our local by-election. If we continue to receive no money from central government, and if all sources of local government funding for improved buses are opposed, how else will the necessary investment in bus services be raised to move Cambridgeshire to a more sustainable franchised model of bus transport?

Northstowe Community Forum 11 January: Northstowe Community Forum will take place on 11 January and, once again, this will be held in person at Northstowe Secondary College. There will be a diverse range of stakeholders coming along to provide interesting topics of conversation.

Sports Pavilion and Heritage Annex Update: Pentaco started building the Sports Pavilion in October and will keep residents informed on their progress via monthly newsletters. Please be aware that the footpath leading to the allotments is closed for the duration of the works. We aim to keep residents updated via social media posts, and a map of the area indicating access routes will be made available soon.

Groundwork has started on the **Heritage Annex**. The building works are due to finish at the end of February, with the exhibition installed by the end of March.

Winter Festival: We are very excited about the upcoming Winter Festival which runs from November – February; it is led by Northstowe Arts and will include a wide range of events, from festive carol singing, lantern parade and workshop, Christmas jumper swap, running winter challenge to a craft fair and much more. Please get in touch if you'd like to get involved. We would also love to celebrate the Chinese New Year, so we're putting a call out to our community for anyone who would like to get involved.

Groups Update: Looking back, Northstowe Running Festival was a success again this year, with over £3000 having been raised for local causes. The Great Big Green Week was also a success with a well-attended Wellbeing Walk, nature themed talks, upcycling workshops and more.

A quick reminder that food from the Community Larder continues to be available on the Olio app, and this could potentially be used to provide refreshments at local events/meetings or to take home.

Why the Cambridge Congestion Charge proposals deserve your attention?

There are still many Cambridgeshire residents unaware of current proposals for a 'Sustainable Travel Zone' in the city, AKA the Cambridge Congestion Charge. If put in place, it would affect a great number of us in South Cambs, as well as those living in the city. As we only have until 23 December to take part in the public consultation, it's important to understand the implications.

The charging zone would extend across a large area of Cambridge, including suburbs, closer villages and the city hospitals. Drivers would pay a daily fee for movements of motor vehicles into, out of and inside it between 7am and 7pm, ranging from £5 per weekday for cars (including electric cars), motorbikes and mopeds, through to £10 for vans and £50 for coaches and HGVs. Money raised from drivers

would be used to fund a significant expansion of the bus network and better cycling and walking links. Main improvements under the proposals would be new bus routes, an increase in rural coverage, longer operating

hours, more frequent services, and flat one-way fares of £1 in the city and £2 in the 'travel to work' area. The Greater Cambridge Partnership, who developed the proposal, also say it would reduce traffic congestion and pollution.

Many people would welcome the kinds of public transport improvements being envisaged, but lots of questions are still being asked — for example, about whether it's fair to fund public transport with a charge only on drivers; the practicality of using buses, bikes and walking for all the many complex and time-sensitive journeys people have to make; why the hospitals are inside the zone; the impact on businesses and the high cost of building and administering the charging infrastructure. There's also the very real issue of affordability: discounts are being developed for those on low pay, but for anyone not eligible, and with no choice but to use their car within the zone on a daily basis, the charge would be equivalent to an annual tax of up to £1200.

The public consultation running until 23 December is your chance to influence the STZ proposals.

OUR GROUNDWATER WAS A KEY ELECTION ISSUE!!

On 3 November, less than six months from the election for the whole of South Cambs DC, we had a by-election in Longstanton ward to replace our two councillors who had resigned together. For a frenzied month, our ward was full of every Liberal Democrat, Conservative and Labour activist from miles around. But then they started talking to people on their doorsteps and found out that our vanished groundwater is a big issue, one that our elected representatives have got to address. Here's what the literature they sent us on a daily basis stated:

Conservative: "Tackle the groundwater collapse – mistakes made during the construction of Northstowe have caused our groundwater levels to fall significantly. Nearby waterways have dried up, destroying precious wildlife habitats, and the resulting ground conditions are damaging buildings. We demand immediate action to halt and reverse this environmental destruction."

Green: "Pause further expansion of Northstowe until the impact on the local water table has been assessed."

Independent: "Longstanton's groundwater table has been dramatically lowered by massive construction. I want the groundwater collapse fully investigated and repaired." "Future development must also be prevented from making the situation worse."

Labour: "There's widespread concern in Longstanton and beyond about the loss of water in local ponds. This all began as work on Northstowe started."

Liberal Democrat: "[We] are committed to uncovering the cause of pond dewatering in Longstanton. The team care a great deal about this issue. They will fight to make sure developers pay for this mistake, not taxpayers."

Well done indeed to residents for ensuring that the groundwater collapse got the prominence it needed in this controversial by-election! Here are the election results:

OW-COST CHRISTMAS IDEAS

Christmas can be an expensive time, but it doesn't necessarily have to be. Of course time saving sometimes has to take precedent over cost, but hopefully some of our ideas on how to save money over this season and utilise creativity will help relieve some of the pressure.

Compact Tree - Why not have a go at making your own Christmas Tree (image by Hannah) by heading out on a walk and collecting branches to create something like this tree shown on the right. The branches are bound together with a length of ribbon and secured with knots, you can find instructions online and spend a small amount on removable self-adhesive hooks to hang it up on your wall.

You could also learn a new skill by researching some simple origami designs to make beautiful garlands of stars and cranes to decorate your tree. It's said that if you make 1000 cranes, you will be granted a wish by the gods so perhaps next year you could be spending Christmas in a warmer climate.

Food:

Share the cost - Playing host doesn't have to mean bearing the financial burden. Encourage friends and family to bring food they'd love to share (like a starter, sides or desert), and their own drinks or use a finance app to set up a pot to buy the Christmas food with.

Use the freezer - Cheese, herbs, breads, cakes, pastries... there are many foods which can be frozen to save on waste.

Reduce waste - why buy sprouts if nobody likes them? Start a new tradition by making side dishes people love instead of items which will moulder away in the fridge. Plan for leftovers, and make some tasty curries, stir-fries or sandwiches from whatever is left from However you're spending Christmas, I hope it's a happy one. Christmas day.

Gifts:

Homemade - Beautifully decorated biscuits, such as those on the right (image from Silke) make fantastic gifts and (recipe dependent) the scents of vanilla, ginger or cinnamon will make your kitchen smell fantastic.

Dependent on time, and skill, a knitted, crochet or patchwork blanket (made from outgrown clothes) can make a beautiful gift for loved ones to keep warm this winter. Or accessories such as a hat, socks or scarf can take less time to create.

Refurbished - Secondhand electronics, which have been professionally cleaned, refurbished, and come with their own warranties can provide a lower cost solution to those more expensive items on people's lists. Be sure to use a website or service which is valid, and well reviewed; if the refurb has been done properly, there shouldn't be issues with setting up or operating devices.

Secondhand - Some people (I'm not one of them) are very good at looking after their things, so buying something secondhand doesn't necessarily mean you are buying something which is damaged or dirty to give to your loved one. Finding a thoughtful gift within a charity shop, car boot or on ebay, can save you funds and if presented with a bit of care and flair, doesn't have to look shabby.

Entertainment - How did people stay entertained before Wi-Fi? There are so many games out there you can play with nothing more than a paper and pen.

Stickyheads - Grab some post-its, write the name of a celebrity, animal or well known person, and try to guess what you are.

Charades - Is it a film, a book or a song? Channel your inner Helen Mirren, Mr Bean or Phoebe Waller-Bridge and take turns playing this Christmas Classic.

The finals of our internal club competitions were held on 3 September and produced some top-quality bowling. The winners were:



NORTHSTOWE SECONDARY COLLEGE (NSC) NEWS

It's been a very busy start to the new academic year for us.

Back in September, we welcomed 134 new students in Year 7, and we are now oversubscribed in Years 7 and 8. We have also welcomed 20 new members of staff, our biggest growth yet as we adjust to being a much bigger school.

It was a real privilege to have our **Open Evening** see such a great turnout. It was so wonderful to have so many of you visit and see the school for the first time. It was also fantastic to see our students volunteer to help and show off their school to prospective students and families. We are currently oversubscribed for next year's intake of Year 7, so they obviously did an excellent job!

It has been great to be able to get some of our students out on some trips and visits already this year. Our Year 7s worked on their team building skills in missions and climbing at Big Rock and Hazard Alley in Milton Keynes, and some of our Year 8 and 9 girls visited Waterbeach Barracks for a 'Make Your Mark' event along with some other local secondary schools. The event featured activities designed to promote careers in the property field to young women. We are looking forward to more trips as we get further into the year: a Year 9 and 10 French and History trip to the Somme, our annual Year 7 residential and our first ski trip as a school. Trips and visits to help students learn outside the classroom are so important for young people; therefore, our Fundraising Committee have committed to helping to support these opportunities for all, by committing to using funds raised to lower the overall costs of trips and continue to maintain our Hardship Fund, available to all families.



Our Academy Council are extremely proud to share the school's success over the last two years in Progress Tests and NGRT (New Group

Reading Test) results. NSC students have not completed GCSEs yet; however, throughout Key Stage 3, students take nationally benchmarked tests to ensure that they are moving in the right direction to reach or exceed their targets. The tests measure students' ability and performance at the start



of Year 7 and then again at the end of Year 7 and 8. Their progress is then measured against their personal starting points, so progress is measured for all students no matter their ability. Our current Year 8 and 9 performed exceptionally well in English and Maths. They performed significantly above the national average. Our whole school fluency programme and literacy strategy have ensured our students make outstanding progress in their reading tests, where reading ages have increased considerably throughout Year 7 and 8.

Our sports department have been busy already with fixtures. Some of

our Year 9 boys played in the County Cup first round in October and are now working hard towards their fixtures within the Meridian Trust Cup. A number of students have been involved in a variety of games that took place in September, which included badminton, netball, football and hockey



against some other local secondary schools. It has been great to see all of the students involved in so much sport.

Finally, on the run up to Christmas, our performing arts department have been working hard to prepare for the NSC Christmas Show on 8th of December. We are looking forward to welcoming parents to see the show.

We wish all of our families and community a happy and healthy festive break.

AN UPDATE FROM FEN DRAYTON LAKES

Work is underway here at RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes on a new family trail to open in the spring. The route will take in several different habitats whilst being less than a mile long, perfect for seeing a little bit of what the reserve as a whole has to offer. Leaving the car park through the gate at the end, the trail will go north through our sandy area of 'early successional grassland', through the small wood and out into the floodplain meadow along the river, before looping back with views over Drayton Lake and Holywell reedbed.

You may have already heard that we are looking to improve our visitor facilities over the next few years. These improvements, of which the new trail is a part, have been in the planning stages for a long time, so we are pleased to say that real progress is now being made.

The first stages of this project involve providing more facilities for visitors to enhance your experience, such as repairing and improving tracks and surfaces, creating wild play features for children and families, opening new trails and providing much needed permanent toilet facilities, helping everyone to enjoy their visit even more. We hope these improvements will benefit all our visitors and that you will support us in this next important step for the reserve.

To help fund these improvements, we will shortly be introducing a £2 car park fee for non-members of RSPB visiting Fen Drayton Lakes. Further details will be posted on our reserve blog post in due course at www.rspb.org.uk/fen-drayton-lakes. RSPB members and Blue Badge holders do not need to pay. This small car parking fee will also help us ensure we are maintaining facilities to a high standard for our visitors' comfort and safety. As a charity, we need to maximise opportunities to raise income wherever possible to financially support our charitable purpose of conserving wildlife and habitats.

Winter is always busy on the reserve, with many birds from northern Europe spending the winter with us. At this time of year, you may be able to spot fieldfares, bullfinches, woodpeckers, herons, great crested grebes and hundreds of over-wintering waterbirds such as goldeneyes and teal. We hope you'll come and see us soon.


ST. MICHAEL'S CHURCH, LONGSTANTON



Jo the Parisheries Standing in the surroundings of St. George's Chapel, Windsor recently, I was struck by a plea from Sir Har-Standing in the surroundings of St. old Brakespear, in September 1920, for 'something drastic to be done...',

with the warning, 'unless the repairs are undertaken, serious consequences will result and there is a grave danger that the building will collapse'. It is hard to believe that the splendour of St. George's Chapel, now the final resting place of Her Majesty Elizabeth II, could have been in such a state. Thankfully, due to the action taken, it is a spectacular reminder of British history, and monarchy, and one of the most visited tourist destinations outside of London.

However, the wording and stark warning was reminiscent of a letter regarding St. Michael's Church back in the 19th century. This letter came into the possession of the Friends of St. Michael's a few years ago, the wording expressed by church architect, Robert Speechly:



A copy of this letter is currently displayed in St. Michael's and is a work of art and a statement of history in itself - the 19th century script a delight to decipher. Reading through the description, you can imagine the poor state of the interior - the explanation for why, unusually, there is a chimney in the thatch and how the substantial

improvements of the late 1800s, thanks to Speechly's assessment, are something we can be thankful for. But ancient buildings cannot stand without some maintenance, and the condition of the roof is crucial to avoid reaching the poor state of repair described by Speechly in the 19th century.

Therefore, the Friends group continues to work at providing events and fundraising occasions for the local community to enjoy. The popularity of 'This is My Theatre' and the latest performance, 'The Nutcracker and the Mouse King', surely will have lived up to their high standards. Following the success of our Platinum Cream Teas this year, we will be celebrating His Majesty's Coronation in a similar way in May, 2023, and will advertise specific details closer to the time. We also participate in the coffee mornings at All Saints church on the first Wednesday of every month.

In the meantime, please do visit the church (open on weekends and on request during the winter) and be aware any contribution, however small, is welcome in our efforts to maintain this lovely building. Within the church, a children's quiz is provided on the noticeboard and the full copy of Robert Speechly's letter is available to read and

LDHS UPDATE: LONGSTANTON December 2022 / January 2023

WORK BEGINS ON THE LONGSTANTON and NORTHSTOWE HERITAGE FACILITY

20th October 2022 was an emotional day, particularly for those of us who have been working towards a local heritage centre for many years. Fifteen years after the Longstanton & District Heritage Society launched at an inaugural meeting in May 2007, a ground-breaking ceremony took place at the site of the new heritage facility being built on the former RAF Oakington airfield. LDHS has to thank many people for their support over the years as that has got us to this point today. This project is the result of many years working alongside Homes England, CCC, and more recently National Highways and others. It's primarily funding from National Highways that has enabled this extra facility to be provided here on such a historic site. This facility will benefit the new town and the surrounding villages for years to come and will provide an important heritage and cultural focal point for the SW Fen Edge. LDHS also needs to thank local residents and members of 7 Squadron Association who have offered us unwavering support over many years. Sadly, many of our original members, including some of RAF Oakington's wartime veterans, are no longer with us to see our shared dream realised. However, they have been our inspiration to keep going every single day. We have kept the promise we made to them and our communities. All members of LDHS, past and present, should be very proud of the part that they have played in helping to achieve this facility. As we begin the next chapter of this story, new members are always welcome and details on how to join can be found on the LDHS website.

AGM & TALK 2022

Maximising the potential of the LDHS Archives and expanding public access is not something the Society can do without considerable support. We hope that as we enter a new chapter in the history of LDHS, many more people will come forward to help ensure that the next fifteen years are as successful as the last fifteen years have been.




Selwyn Richardson presenting his talk The 1947 Floods following the 2022 LDHS AGM.

The AGM was followed by a fascinating and informative talk, given by Selwyn Richardson on the 1947 Floods. Selwyn has farming connections within the Fenland area and this close association shone through in his talk. This was the first talk organised by LDHS since the start of the Covid pandemic in 2020, but in-person turnout was disappointingly low. No nonmembers or residents of Northstowe attended despite publicity for the talk being shared across social media groups. LDHS was hoping to begin regular talks again in 2023, but in view of the turnout for this talk, we will delay restarting the programme. This delay will allow the Society to concentrate on preparations for moving to the new heritage building, and it will also allow us to investigate how we can attract more people to these talks and the Society in general.

We welcome feedback regarding our heritage talks from members and also residents of Northstowe, Longstanton, Oakington and other surrounding villages. Which night would people prefer? Which location? Which topics? Perhaps the new heritage facility could be used as a venue for these talks? Talks will be discussed at future Steering Group meetings - if we could use the building free of charge it would enable the cost for non-members to be kept to a minimum. Whatever the

cause of the low in-person attendance on 27 October, LDHS feels the need to get to the bottom of it. We were fortunate on Friday to have some members accessing the talk remotely, but we do not feel it is fair to speakers to be asked to drive some distance to Longstanton or Northstowe if there are insufficient numbers of attendees to justify their effort.
