

By the time you read this it will be February, and we will be looking forward to the days getting longer and spring approaching. Here is my summary of Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) matters at the time of writing in mid-January. **Making Connections consultation:** The Greater Cambridge Partnership *Making Connections* 2022 consultation closed on Friday, 23 December. Around 23,000 responses have been received, and the

Greater Cambridge Partnership expects to publish a final report on the consultation outcomes and next steps for consideration by its Board in June 2023. The consultation is about proposals for public transport improvements, and better cycling and walking options, as well as about the element which has been most talked about: a congestion charge.

Any decision on a charge for driving on roads in Cambridge, or anywhere else in the county, would be a matter for Cambridgeshire County Council. We do not yet know whether a proposal for a congestion charge will progress beyond the consultation, or, if it does, what it might look like after the public responses to the consultation have been considered. We would expect the proposals in the consultation, including the proposal for a congestion charge, to be significantly changed by the public response to the consultation. And I would want and need to know what the public, *all* the public responding to the consultation thought before casting vote.

Household Recycling Centre planned at Northstowe: In the original plans for Northstowe Phase 1, a Household Recycling Centre (HRC) was planned to comply with the size of the town. Following CCC Planning Committee on 16 November 2022, permission was granted for the Milton HRC to be

Tree Planting: We said we'd planned to plant more trees this year, with an ambitious target to take trees from the Queen's Green Canopy, and other schemes, and improve the number of trees in our village. January is here and so are the trees! We are receiving 1800+ small trees to plant around the village. We are finalising locations (land that the Parish Council owns). Some will be on the B1050 perimeter bypass to help provide a noise screen in future years. Other locations will be confirmed shortly, and we may be able to have a "planting weekend" before the end of the planting season where everyone can get involved. More details on this to come. Additionally, we've managed to secure funding originally scheduled for something else from the A14 Legacy Fund. This will be used to plant more mature trees and bulbs and securing the Village Green, and work on this will start in February.

Work continues on many other topics, but as we have been a bit quieter owing to the Christmas break, I'll provide a more detailed update next issue.

redeveloped and expanded; therefore, a site would no longer be required in Northstowe but S106 funds will still be required. Following this permission, CCC planning officers consulted with the Planning Casework Unit for the Department for Levelling Up, Housing & Communities (DLUHC) on behalf of the Secretary of State, who confirmed that they are not calling in this planning application and are content for CCC to proceed.

CCC waste officers will now look to use the funds secured in the Northstowe Phase 1 S106 to help implement this permission for Milton HRC, and, as part of that, discuss a deed of variation to allow consideration of an alternative land use for the current proposed HRC site in Northstowe Phase 1. This item will be on the future agenda at Northstowe Delivery Group monthly meetings.

School Lane: The matter of the ever-decreasing state of School Lane has been ongoing as the state of the roads across Cambridgeshire deteriorates following extreme weather conditions last year. Patching and surface dressing will have been applied at the end of January and next financial year there will be resurfacing of the whole road.

Election results: May I take this opportunity to thank all those who voted in and helped with the by-election on 3 November. I am delighted to be given the opportunity to serve as your District Councillor and will work hard to represent your interests at the District level. I would like to congratulate Cllr Natalie Warren-Green, who was also elected in Longstanton ward, and to thank Sarah Cheung-Johnson and Alex Malyon for their service as your retiring councillors and to wish them well as they now focus

on raising their young families.

During the many doorstep conversations that I had with residents of the ward, three issues clearly emerged that need to be addressed:

- Ensuring that the District Council takes action to resolve the problems with the groundwater and underground aguifer that have led to the ponds in Longstanton and Northstowe drying up:
- Holding the developers and the District Council to account for the delivery of community facilities such as shops, a community centre and GP's surgery in Northstowe; and
- Campaigning to stop the imposition of a Congestion Charge in Cambridge.

Groundwater issue: At the July 2021 meeting of the District Council (when I was District Councillor for Girton ward), I asked a question about what was being done to follow up on the HR Wallingford report into the possible cause of the drying up of the ponds. In answer to my question, we were promised that an Action Plan had been written and was being reviewed by the parish and town councils and ward councillors. I asked a further question at the November 2022 Council meeting about when the Action Plan would be made public. This Action Plan took a very long time to come into the public domain, but the District Council has now created a section on its website at www.scambs.gov.uk/ communitysafety-and-health/northstowe/northstowe-groundwater-

investigations that contains links to the HR Wallingford reports, and the Action Plan, and provides a description of the various issues.

I don't think that this is adequate yet, but at least it is a start, and the main issues are now in the open, where residents can read about and access the relevant documents. The text starts off by saying that it is the Environment Agency that is responsible for enforcing legislation on matters to do with groundwater. This may be true in a technical sense, but as the Local Planning Authority, the District Council is in a much greater position of leverage. Property developers who wish to continue making a profit, and who wish their planning applications to continue to be approved, need to be on their best behaviour. It is easy for developers to wriggle their way out of following regulations when no-one is watching, but it is ultimately the power to pause or stop future development approvals that will make them sit up and notice.

Congestion Charge: The Greater Cambridge partnership's consultation on its Congestion Charging scheme has now closed.

There is a petition asking for Cambridgeshire County Council to hold a referendum before implementing this new tax: www.cambridgeshire.cmis.uk.com/ccc_live/ePetitions/tabid/ 115/ID/60/-Petition-demanding-referendum-to-decide-oncongestion-charge-for-Cambridge.aspx.

The £5 daily charge would cover the whole city, including Addenbrooke's and Royal Papworth hospitals. I believe we need to make sure that our hospitals are easily accessible from both the city and the countryside.

It's been a couple of months since the byelection for two District Councillors for the Longstanton Ward. which includes Longstanton, Northstowe, Oakington and Westwick, and I would like to thank all those residents of Longstanton who voted for me to become the top candidate. I feel both honoured and privileged to have taken on this role.

Nine candidates stood for election to replace Cllrs Alex Malyon and Sarah Cheung Johnson, both Longstanton residents, who resigned in October 2022. I would like to extend my gratitude and appreciation to Sarah and Alex, who have fully briefed me, having themselves made the decision to step down and focus on their families after four years serving this community. Their hard work and commitment throughout their tenure has been recognised by many residents, and I have been told often while canvassing and since becoming District Councillor that 'theirs are big shoes to fill'. I am pleased to remain in contact with them to provide continuity and they are being very supportive. I also would like to thank Cllr Firouz Thompson for her support, and we are working together as a strong and coordinated team in her remit of County Councillor. Cllr Bill Handley, Lead Cabinet Member for New Towns and Cllr Tumi Hawkins for Planning at South Cambridgeshire District Council are also supporting the transition.

Personally, I am starting to apply my experience of change, transformation and transition in the public and private sector to understand how best to support the frustrations of the community and to support progress on housing and amenity development, local transport and related charges, and issues with water and environmental factors, being experienced in Northstowe, Longstanton, and Oakington & Westwick.

A key focus for Longstanton continues to be investigations into groundwater about which I am liaising with LEGG (Longstanton Environmental & Groundwater Group), SCDC (South Cambs District Council) and Longstanton Parish Council. I am pleased to share that Longstanton resident and Independent Candidate in the by-election, Debbie Poyser, is also active in the investigation and continues to work with LEGG to identify how best to resolve the issues, adding local knowledge and value to the discussions. It is good to be working with a group of people constructively trying to resolve the groundwater concerns, and I will continue to support facilitation of the process as best I can in my capacity as District Councillor.

On a very positive note, I attended events in Longstanton over the festive season including the Christmas Fayre, lighting of the Christmas tree, and on the same evening, watched the participation of Hatton Park School in the Northstowe Festival of Lights music performances. These gave me insight into the community spirit in the village, extending to participating in Northstowe events, and I look forward to attending more Longstanton events in 2023 to share the energy of the local community.

I know that to keep the energy high, residents need support from SCDC. Before the by-election, I heard that residents trust the LibDem-run District Council, but that we need to show progress on the local issues, like water, and on delivery of facilities in Northstowe, as well as about public transport. I'll be working hard with Longstanton, Oakington and Westwick Parish Councils and Northstowe Council, community groups, residents and Senior Delivery Managers at SCDC to make a difference in 2023.

Northstowe Community Development Officer

Northstowe Community Forum 29 March: Northstowe Community Forum will take place on 29 March. There will be a diverse range of stakeholders that will provide updates and interesting topics of conversation.

Subject specific drop-in: The CDOs hosted a drop-in at the Secondary College on Wednesday, 7 December. Greenbelt were on-site to answer questions on management and maintenance of open spaces. This was from 3pm-7pm, which allowed the opportunity for people to attend after work. The Community Development team was there to answer general questions, take contact details and forward some questions to the relevant parties. We are hoping to make this a regular occurrence; we would welcome suggestions from residents on future themes.

Defibrillator: The defibrillator, which was previously located at the David Wilson show home, has now been relocated to Pathfinder Primary School in Northstowe. This was installed by a qualified electrician courtesy of JLBElectrical, and it will be serviced by a professional contractor beginning of February. The defibrillator is located on the school's external wall to the right of the building, as the site is accessed from the main gates. We will inform the community when it is ready for use.

Welcome Packs : We have delivered the final Welcome Packs of 2022 in December and look forward to welcoming new residents in 2023.

The Winter Festival: Mihaela supported the Town Council at the Winter Festival during Light Up Northstowe and was on hand to talk to the local community. The Christmas jumper swap was a great initiative from Sustainable Northstowe, as well as the festive carols, wellness walks and running challenges from various community groups. The Winter Festival will run until the end of February. If you have an idea of an event that can be celebrated as part of this, please get in touch.

Warm Hubs: We are continuing to support the Town Council with the Warm Hubs and have recruited a number of volunteers from the community to manage the project. These started on 4 January in the Secondary College on Wednesday mornings and Thursday afternoons. We would like to ask residents if they have any suitable activities (boardgames, arts and crafts) to donate or talks they would like to give.

The Community Development Team are also working with the Children's Centre to support their Family Warm Space sessions, which will take place on a Thursday morning at Pathfinder School.

Northstowe Allotments: We are supporting the Northstowe Horticultural Association to identify volunteers who would like to take over some of the raised beds they are building. Volunteers will also be needed for the Community Day on 4 February to work on the Community Garden. Please get in touch if you'd be interested in participating in any of these initiatives.

We would also like to hear from you if you have any ideas where the community can get involved and would be happy to support you to deliver these.

Kickstart Fund: Do you have an idea for a new community group or activity? We have a funding pot of £30,000 and community organisations can apply for up to £1,000 each. The Kickstart Fund aims to remove financial barriers to setting up community groups and activities and help with start-up costs, such as renting a room or buying equipment. Once the Kickstart Funding application has been received, it will be reviewed by a panel and you will be informed if you have been successful.

ONGSTANTON ENVIRONMENTAL & GROUNDWATER GROUP (LEGG)

Geography, water and some serious questions...



The Longstanton groundwater issue did not go away over Christmas. As time Accident or intent? passes, LEGG (the Longstanton Environmental and Groundwater Group) is gaining a better understanding of the mechagroundwater in our village, and we are ended up.

We are indebted to Google Earth. Really! Among its many functions, it can display an altitude profile of the land along any line you draw on the map. We have used it to plot the profile of the northern swale in Northstowe, along a line from the Kingfisher Pond to the northern end of the Phase 1 lake. The results were instructive.

The altitude of the Kingfisher Pond and the area immediately to the east of it is 10 metres, the same as most parts of Longstanton. Travelling east, past Claudius Walk, the level falls gradually as far as Stirling Road, then more steeply down to the Northstowe Phase 1 lake, whose altitude is around 6 metres - drop of only 4 metres, but those 4 metres are crucial. The lower levels, which include houses adjacent to the lake and the Urban Splash development, lie in areas which, in past years, regularly flooded in the winter.

Building on a flood plain is generally not recommended, but for various reasons, we do a lot of it in England. To make it possible, building land levels have to be raised artificially and wet areas have to be drained. The land on which Northstowe is built drains first into the lakes and, when the level in the lakes rises, into ditches and drains that lead eventually to the River Great Ouse.

And here lies the problem. Northstowe is built on top of the same gravel aquifer that underlies Longstanton. The aquifer is the source of the water in our ponds and wells; it also prevents drying of the subsoil and possible building damage. When the aquifer is full, the water floods to the surface, but if you drain the aquifer www.LEGGinfo.co.uk. sufficiently to protect low-lying areas of Northstowe from flooding,

you also deplete the water that feeds Longstanton's water features and protects its buildings.

When work began on Northstowe in 2015, one of the first side effects noticed was the drying out of the Kingfisher Pond. At that nisms that may have led to the loss of time, developers assured us that the loss of water was only temporary and the pond would soon return to normal. We do not see beginning to understand where that water how there could ever be a normal water level in the pond – at 10 metres - if they were draining the aquifer to a level of 6 metres to protect new housing.

> LEGG has convened a meeting with representatives of Longstanton Parish Council, South Cambs District Council and Northstowe developers to seek answers to this and other questions.

We will be asking:

- whether the Northstowe swales were specifically designed to drain the aquifer, to what level and whether or not this was intended as an on-going process;

why local residents were repeatedly told that the reduction in the water level would be temporary, when any competent engineer with an understanding of the land's hydrology must have known otherwise:

what action is to be taken to remedy damage, both present and future, done to Longstanton, and who will meet the costs of such action:

whether or not SCDC agrees that proceeding with Phase 3A, which may well involve further interference with the aquifer, would be profoundly unwise before the outstanding issues with Phase 1 have been resolved.

It will be interesting to see whether SCDC's recent interest in matters of the environment at least result in a serious expression of intent to take positive action.

SUSTAINABLE NORTHSTOWE

December updates




LDHS is delighted to have been asked to support the *Northstowe Arts Sculpture Project for the Heritage Annex.* This project will use broken shards of pottery from the Northstowe site to create a work of art for the new heritage building. In order to help local residents understand the historical context of the material being used, this LDHS Update has kindly been written by Dr Oscar Aldred of CAU and we thank him for his contribution. Dr Aldred has worked extensively on the Northstowe site for a number of years and the discoveries made by archaeologists not only explain the history of the Northstowe site but also add to our understanding of how local communities interacted with each other, the Fen Edge and the wider local area.



Excavating the past: a short history of Northstowe's archaeology

Dr Oscar Aldred, Cambridge Archaeological Unit, Department of Archaeology, University of Cambridge (ora20@cam.ac.uk)

The long-term history of the communities that lived within the area covered by the Northstowe development is told through archaeological features and finds. Fortunately, the evaluations and excavations conducted by the Cambridge Archaeological Unit, Department of Archaeology, University of Cambridge between 2004 to 2007, and 2014 to 2019 (principally Phases 1 & 2) recovered a lot of amazing material to tell

this story. Starting in prehistory, artefacts, such as small flint blades from the Mesolithic period (c. 10,000 years ago) were found in later features, along with Late Neolithic (c. 6,000 year ago) objects, such as a Cornish Greensand polished axe. The objects were connected with seasonal and temporary activities. However, in the Middle to Late Bronze Age (c. 3-4,000 years ago), field systems comprising large, co-joined ditched enclosures were established, within which animals such as cattle and sheep grazed. These field systems covered the area known as Inholmes and Purcell fields (Northstowe Phase 1). In addition, localised pitting dating to the Late Bronze Age to Early Iron Age (c. 2,800-3,000 years ago) occurred, suggesting seasonal activity with camping amongst the fields, rather than fully Occasionally, developed settlement. during this seasonal work, people died. They were buried amongst the fields, connected with a few Middle to Late Bronze Age un-urned cremation burials.

A change from seasonal occupation to permanent settlement occurred in the Middle Iron Age to Late Iron Age period (c. 2,100-2,300 years ago). In the latter part of the period, there was an increase in the size and density of occupation - about thirty settlements have been identified so far - ranging from small, single farmsteads with single enclosures, to more complex settlement and field arrangements. This also included interconnected settlements, which were joined by long linear ditches. Large amounts of material culture were found, including pottery (used for cooking and eating food, but also for food storage), and food debris in the form of animal bone.

Worked bone tools, loom weights for weaving, worked stone such as querns, as well as precious objects such as brooches and local tribal and Roman Republic coins were also found. Communities at this time became much more organized, creating long ditches and trackways between settlements, probably helping to harness communal spaces for growing crops and grazing animals.







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LDHS UPDATE: LONGSTANTON February - March 2023



The Roman invasion of Britain in the first century CE was arguably more of a cultural invasion than one involving the mass migration of people (besides the military).

However, across Northstowe, it produced a change in the organisation of local settlement spaces, with a clear up-take of

Roman material culture (things like pottery and precious objects, such as coinage and brooches).

Across the Northstowe development area, three large Roman period settlements were established, two of which we know were on top of earlier Iron Age ones.

These three were Site 18 (Beck Brook), Site 19 (Inholmes) and Site 20 (Fishpond Cottages). A fourth settlement (Site 26) was a high status settlement, possibly a villa or Mansion. These settlements shaped the surrounding landscape for the next four hundred years or so.

Like the preceding Iron Age settlements, they were also connected but by a series of trackways, linking the settlements to each other but also to grazing areas (e.g., towards the fen-edge and the clay uplands), main communication routes (e.g. via devana) and other settlements (e.g. North-West Cambridge hinterland, Cambridge small town, Arbury Camp and King Hedges villa, Fenstanton, Cottenham, Over, Willingham, and the Earith 'port' of Camp Ground).

Locally made pottery (as well as imported), animal bone, worked stone, bone tools, metal objects (e.g., coins, brooches, toiletry sets), and a complex infrastructure of drainage ditches were found at Sites 18 and 19, along with two main cemetery areas, houses, shrines, and small-scale industrial remains (e.g., corn drier oven, kiln, cistern and wells). Some special objects were found, including a copper alloy stag's head for a sceptre used in religious practices, the spout of a face flagon – the 'Northstowe lady', a Barnack stone altar, and a pewter plate; see photograph.

As the settlements progressed into the fourth and fifth centuries CE, the Roman administration that kept the systems of exchange and trade in place failed.

This created opportunities for new communities to emerge (possibly the ones that occupied the Roman period settlements, but also new ones too).

This period is called the 'dark ages' because there is little surviving, or it is hard to identify. However, at

Northstowe, there is a relatively well preserved 'dark age' presence connected with early-fifth and sixth century CE settlements and burials.

This evidence sits alongside new styles of pottery and metal working, especially brooches. In many ways, these new settlements, which were open clusters of structures and pits, reverted to an Iron Age type of settlement: dispersed small farmsteads, located at the edges of the former (Roman) settlements.

Eventually, from the late-seventh to eighth century CE, another period of re-organisation occurred: centrally placed and permanent settlements, with enclosures and hall-like buildings. This community began the start of the medieval village of Longstanton.

Probably from this time, the former prehistoric Iron Age, Roman and 'dark age' field and settlement areas were turned into Longstanton and Oakington's fields and trackways, with its familiar nineteenth century field names: Stanwell/Stanhill, Inholmes, Purcell, and Mill Field and trackways called Great More Balk, Moor Way, Broad Way and Stanwell Way.

The Cambridge Archaeological Unit was commissioned to undertake the Phase 1 excavations by Gallagher Estates, and Phase 2 excavations by Homes England. These excavations were monitored by the Cambridgeshire Historic Environment Team (CHET) at Cambridgeshire County Council.
